Reading	10 mins daily.	<b>Read</b> your books and complete your reading record. Refer to the Oxford Owl link for a wide range of books for different abilities.	
Reading	20 mins daily	Our new learning will be based around the story of ' <b>One is a Snail, Ten is a Crab</b> ' by April Pulley Sayre and Jeff Sayre. You will enjoy listening to it being read on Tapestry by Mrs Gaughran. This is a fun story all about numbers and counting. What do you notice when you are reading the book? Can you predict what number will come next? Can you count the feet? The white arrows will help you. Have you read any other counting books or have books with numbers in them? Perhaps you could use your imagination to come up with one of your own?	
Phonics	10 mins daily	<p>After accessing the <b>phonics</b> lessons that have been set for you on our Facebook Phonics (Facebook Group Name: Eversley Primary School Reception 2020) page Monday and Thursday at 10am, revise the sounds that have been taught. Continue to practice forming letters and sounds correctly according to the rhymes learned and listen out for the daily challenges set for that sound!</p> <p><b><u>Extra challenges:</u></b> <b><u>Rhyming words!</u></b> Have a look at some of the creatures in the story and see if you can come up with rhyming words for them, e.g. snail, whale, tail. Dog, log, fog. Why not then use your rhyming words to make a funny sentence, e.g. The great big snail grew a long pink tail. You don't have to use the animals in the story, if you prefer you can use any words or objects to find rhyming words such as sun, fun, bun, run for example and enjoy making your rhyme as funny as you can.</p> <p><b><u>Seaside adventures!</u></b> We talked about settings last week. This book is set on the beach. Have you ever been to a beach or to the seaside? What did you see there? Did you do anything special? Did you take a picnic? Perhaps you could draw a picture of the seashore or a beach and label the different features or write about a time that you went to the seaside.</p>	

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		<p>As well as Miss Cookson's phonics session (Explained above), <b>Read Write Inc (RWI)</b> are offering daily phonics lessons on You Tube. These are split into different ability groups to cater for the varying needs of the children. The first sounds are set 1 (individual sounds, s, m, a, d, etc) and the others are set 2 (which Miss Cookson is also teaching each Monday and Thursday). Set 3 are for Year One pupils, therefore, please do not access these as this could confuse the children. Mathematics	10 mins daily	<p>We are going to be using the different characters in the book '<b>One is a Snail, Ten is a Crab</b>' and count their feet to help us learn about adding, recognising groups and counting in different ways.</p> <p>In the story we can learn about counting, making number connections and grouping. Why not have a go at grouping objects practically in different ways and see what you notice. Using 20 pencils, buttons, counters etc. put them firstly into groups of 2s. How many groups are there? Now put them into groups of 10? Now groups of 5? What did you notice about the total number of objects and the total number of groups? Are there still 20 objects? How many different ways did you make that total e.g. 10 groups of 2, 4 groups of 5 and 2 groups of 10. Why not spend some time exploring this with other objects and different totals.</p> <p>Why not use the characters from the story to make totals! Can you make 8? What animals do you need to make 10? Perhaps a grown up could challenge you to work out the total of adding an insect and a spider, or a person and a crab? There are many different combinations for you to explore. (The book goes up to 100 so you can even investigate higher values if you want an extra challenge!)</p>	

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		<p><b><u>Time.</u></b> As the book is set on the beach and it looks very warm, what time of year do you think it is? What season might it be set in or what month might it be? What month would come before that or after it? What season follows? Recap the work that we did on the days of the week, months of the year and seasons. What season are we in now? What month is it? How many days are in this month? What will come next? What month is your birthday?</p>	
Physical Education	30 mins daily	'Run to the correct number'. Put numbers 1-10 around your house or garden and run to that spot when the animal is called with that number of feet, e.g. if "dog" is called run to number 4 if "crab" is called run to 10. Use a timer to see if you can beat your time!	
Personal, Social and emotional development	30 mins daily	Have fun with games! Why not play 'Hangman' using the names of animals and minibeasts for others to try and guess using the correct phonemes!	
Understanding the world	20 mins daily	Have you ever been to a beach or the seaside? What sort of animals would you find there? Have you ever searched in a rock pool? What does a sea anemone look like or a limpet? Perhaps you could find out about animals and <b>seaside habitats</b> . If you have found this interesting, you might want to expand this and begin to explore other habitats to find out why different animals need different environments to survive. Do some animals need the heat or some need to be in a cold place? Why?  In the book that we are reading this week, there is a snail on the front cover. Can you find out some interesting facts about snails? What do they eat? How fast can they move? Are there different types of snails? Perhaps you might like to explore and research facts about other minibeasts? We would love to hear all about what you find out. You could record your work in the form of a poster, an information book or make some fact cards?	
Expressive arts and design	½ hour per day	Why not create a mini beach on an old tray? If you have some sand you could use it for the beach and use collage materials to make the sea, draw and cut out some shells and other features.	

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		<p>Why not use junk modelling to make some creatures? Have fun creating crabs, snails and other minibeasts using egg cartons, pipe cleaners and googly eyes.</p> <p>Why not make your own beach role play area at home? You could use some yellow and blue fabric for the sand and sea and make some shells and sea creatures too. You could even make a little ice cream stall and pretend to sell some ice cream and drinks to eat and drink on the beach. Perhaps you could have a picnic with your family at your own home made beach!</p> <p>We hope that you enjoy exploring this, please share your learning with us on Tapestry.</p>
