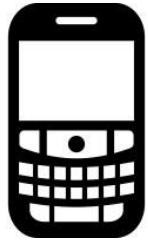

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Ways a homeless charity might help

- Where is your home?

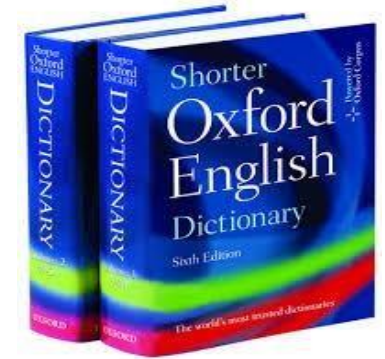
- What important information will you include?

- Campaign – a planned set of activities or course of action to achieve a goal.
- Commercial – involved with making money or profits.
- Host – someone who has invited guests and may provide them with food, drink and entertainment.
- Makeshift – something that is temporary and acting as an interim.

- Predict – say or estimate that something will happen in the future.
- Suggest – put forward a plan or idea for someone to think about.
