## Key Knowledge

### Learning about religion

That Hinduism originated in India more than 4,000 years ago. Hindus can pray at home or in their temple called a Mandir.

One of the main beliefs of Hinduism is that there is only one God, Brahman, but he takes many forms.

During the festival of Diwali, Hindus retell the story of Rama and Sita which is about the triumph of good over evil.

Diwali is celebrated in various ways including wearing new clothes, setting off fireworks, leaving out Diya lamps, visiting family and exchanging gifts.

### Learning from religion

From the story, we can learn to be kind and helpful people.

That we can do things in our lives that give us the same sense of community and belonging.

Spelling	Definition
Festival	A gathering of people to celebrate something.
Diwali/Divali	Diwali means "rows of lighted lamps".
Mandir	The name for the Hindu place of worship.
Triumph	Winning over something.
Rangoli	Folk art used during Hindu festivals to bring good luck and welcome the Hindu Gods.
Diya/Diya lamps	Small oil lamps that are placed around the home and in gardens to remember how Rama and Sita were welcomed home.
