Key Knowledge

Learning about religion

Guru Nanak was the first Sikh Guru. He came from a small town in India 500 years ago. He taught his followers that everyone was equal. His first job was as a shopkeeper. He told people who came to the shop about how to love and follow God.

People called him 'Guru' because he taught them about God. He travelled around India, spreading God's message that everyone is equal.

When Guru Nanak died, Guru Angad became the next guru. He continued to spread Guru Nanak's message.

Following on from Guru Angad, each subsequent Guru introduced something new to the religion and practices.

Learning from religion

People can be positive role models for others and can encourage them to live fulfilled lives.

Respecting the beliefs and views of others is essential to being part of a community.

We can help others by being generous with our time and resources.

- make connections between narratives about key events from the lives of the Gurus and their teachings about God and how to be a good Sikh.

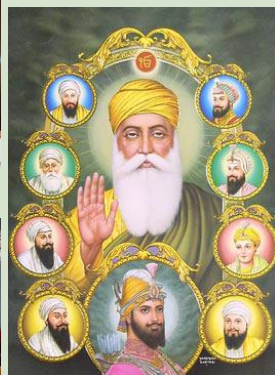
Prior learning

Spelling	Definition
Guru	Teacher: used in Sikhism to refer to the ten human Gurus and the Guru Granth Sahib
Gurdwara	Sikh place of worship
Guru Granth Sahib	Sikh Holy Book
Sewa	To provide a service to the community, including the Sikh community and others
Langar	Gurdwara dining hall and the food served in it.
