Throughout our lives we go on a series of journeys, some may be long, others short, some ordinary, others exciting.

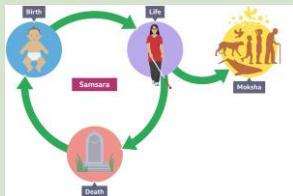
There are a range of ceremonies a Christian might participate in to show their initiation or commitment to their religion. These include a baptism, a confirmation and a believers baptism. Water is used in some of these ceremonies to signify a fresh start and washing away sins.

Jewish people can show their dedication to their religion by becoming Bar/Bat Mitzvah during a special ceremony. Ahead of this ceremony, Jewish children are expected to learn about their religion in detail. Following it, they are then considered a son or daughter of the commandment and are considered responsible for their own religious decisions and actions.

One of the main beliefs of many Hindus is that our lifetime is one part of a larger journey. This is known as Samsara which is the cycle of reincarnation or rebirth. This means next life is determined by how a person lives their current life.

For some people, a marriage ceremony is part of their journey through life. Religious marriages are different to each other but often share the same core principles; a life-long commitment, faithfulness, a promise to share a life with someone else.
