I would like an orange juice please.

Asking for an order in a café (waiter)

Que désirez-vous ?

Vous désirez ?

What would you like?

Je vous écoute.

I'm listening (to your order).

Asking for and giving the bill.

- **L'addition s'il vous plaît.**

- **Cinq euros quarante.**

- *The bill please.*

- **€5.40**

to want

When ordering food or drink we use the conditional tense of **vouloir**.

Je voudrais...

I would like...

Giving fillings, toppings and flavours

When giving fillings for sandwiches, toppings for pancakes or ice cream flavours use:

au (masculine)

à la (feminine)

Un sandwich au thon.

A tuna sandwich.

Une crêpe à la confiture.

A jam pancake.

Formal forms

When saying please to an adult not in our family or to someone we don't know, we use:

s'il vous plaît

For others we use the familiar form of please:

s'il te plaît

Le croissant

A croissant is so-called due to its crescent shape. It is formed by cutting a triangle of dough, rolling it three and a half times before curving the ends inwards to make its distinctive shape.
