Key Knowledge

Many people have things/people/beliefs in their lives that are important to them. For some people, God is the most important.

Muslims believe Allah is so important that when a baby is born, the first thing they hear should be about Allah. The words "God is most great. There is no God but Allah" are whispered into the baby's ear. This is known as the Shahadah.

Many people also look up to leaders in their lives. For Muslims, one very important leader is The Prophet Muhammad. He has over 1.5 billion followers who respect him, all over the world. Over 1400 years he taught all Muslim people how to follow God. He is so special that when Muslims talk about him, when they say his name, many of them say 'Peace be upon him'. And when they write his name, many put the letters 'PBUH' after his name.

There are many stories of the Prophet that Muslims enjoy retelling such as Muhammad and the cat, Muhammad and the ants and Muhammad and the thirsty camel. Each of these stories teach Muslims to be kind and considerate towards other living creatures as well as how to appreciate Allah's creation.
